

Minutes of the meeting of

1. Welcome and Apologies

JR welcomed everyone to the meeting and attendees introduced themselves.

Agenda items 7 (Cases) and 8 (AOCB) on the agenda were agreed to be swapped to ensure time to prioritise discussion of cases.

Stuart Allen and Mary McLeod Rivett are stepping down from the Panel after this meeting, and JR offered them her thanks for their valuable input over the years. Paul McDonald’s term had come to an end since the last meeting and again JR thanked him for his input. However, given item TT91/22 JR proposed and the Panel agreed that PM attend the first part of the meeting as an Observer

2. Minutes of the Last Meeting (June 2022)

The minutes of the last meeting were approved.

3. Chair – news and current issues

JR requested that future minutes of Panel meetings be more detailed to ensure a transparent audit trail for the Panel’s decisions and actions. Drafts of minutes are to be produced within 10 working days of meetings [**ACTION – MINUTE TAKERS**]

4. TTU Report

EF reported that the new TTU staff members had now started. Antony Lee is the new permanent TTU Officer and Janel Fontaine, George Prew and Carl Savage are on 18-month contracts. The rate of finds recording is being tracked and between 10/10/2022 and 4/11/2022 901 finds were recorded, including progress on the Dunscore hoard. This is an average of 11 finds per day per person.

At the time of the meeting, 12,237 finds had been receipted so far this year, compared with 2019 where 2,119 were handed in. EF is currently working to track pre- and post-pandemic trends. Digital workflows and the Case Management System are improving efficiency. JR was pleased that there was progress on managing the backlog and asked that data and outputs be a focus for future updates.

EF reported that outreach trips and public finds days had recently been completed to Aberdeen, Fort William and Inverness. More outreach is being planned for 2023, including finds days at Dumfries, Glasgow, Melrose and Falkirk, with longer trips such as Shetland also being planned. JO'S asked if there was a policy on the travel methods used for these trips. EF replied that NMS policy was followed. Due to the transportation of finds and multiple staff travelling, hire cars were generally the most efficient option but public transport was used wherever possible. Overnight stays were avoided and efficiencies in accommodation always sought.

KR asked if it was possible to determine a timescale for the removal of the backlog, acknowledging that new material was constantly coming in. EF noted that the current focus is on pre-Covid finds, including current claims for the Panel.

JR requested graphed presentation of data in future [**ACTION - EF**]. RS seconded the graphic presentation of data and added that if outreach activity produced an unmanageable workload then the amount conducted in future might need to be questioned.

JO'S reported that MGS are trying to establish a geographical museum forum in Shetland which would see various museums, including independents, gathering together and suggested that TTU work might benefit from syncing with such activity. All agreed that this sounded an excellent idea and EF will contact JO'S to discuss this further [**ACTION - EF**]

5. NMS Report

FH reported that Stuart Allen is leaving NMS and will therefore no longer be the NMS representative on the Panel. His replacement is currently being recruited and FH is acting as interim Keeper of Scottish History and Archaeology. FH is likely to attend the next meeting but the new Keeper will decide who represents the department going forward.

The Galloway hoard has returned from tour and has had an extremely positive reception in Aberdeen. JR noted that the legal challenge regarding the Galloway hoard had been in the press, in the Times and the Scottish Daily Mail.

FH reported that NMS will have new X-ray facilities next year which may be of use to TTU.

6. KLTR Report

RS reported that John Logue is the new interim KLTR. He is keen that the proposed 2023 review proceeds as planned, and RS will manage this process. The proposal is that there will be an external chair appointed and the process will last 12 months, including public and stakeholder group consultations, before Ministerial sign-off.

Members welcomed the review and JR asked whether it could be aligned with the Archaeology Strategy. FH who has just stepped down from the Scottish Strategic Archaeology committee stated that the review of the Strategy wasn't planned until 2025 but agreed that there is overlap and some alignment would be valuable. JR asked if the review could be accelerated and whether HES would be taking a lead. KR and MH suggested contacting the Chair of the committee to discuss, and KR offered to speak to HES about what role they might be able to play [**ACTION – KR**]. FH added that HES is secretariat to the Strategy and that Rebecca Jones has been leading on it but is leaving and who will take up the role is not yet clear.

7. Cases

TT 91/22 (Blade with fleur de lis hilt)

The documents related to the object were reviewed at the previous Panel, and to ensure clarity JR read out the minutes of the previous discussion. JR summarised as general agreement that the object is unique.

As requested at the previous panel meeting, TTU sought an opinion from the Royal Armouries Museum and an informal opinion had further been provided by a curator at the Wallace Collection. The finder had also provided a report produced by James Elmslie.

The panel heard further information from PM based on his direct study of the object since 2015.

PM left the meeting

The panel considered all of the opinions and analysis pertaining to case TT 91/22, and considered the *ex gratia* award with reference to comparanda comprising of Medieval and later small blades available on the market.

Panel consensus was that identification was still inconclusive and requested that TTU review the *ex gratia* award ahead of allocation. [**ACTION – TTU**]

JR also asked whether the finder has access to all of the reports. EF replied that he does, and JR suggested adding dates to all reports in future to aid future reference [**ACTION – TTU**].

JR asked that in future all documents be provided at one time as part of the protocols of the process, to ensure all information was fairly taken into account and to provide an easier audit trail. RS agreed [**ACTION – EF**].

Aberdeenshire allocations

The University of Aberdeen (UoA) and Aberdeenshire Museums Service (AMS) are unable to agree how cases that they have both bid for should be allocated. A letter was sent to both parties after the previous Panel meeting but both responded that they wished the Panel to determine allocation. Several claimed cases brought to this Panel meeting had also received conflicting applications.

The Code of Practice (Appendix M) was consulted as a basis for decision making. It was noted that AMS had a better developed public access remit. As UoA do not have permanent displays, it was agreed that all cases should be allocated to AMS. It was also suggested that both parties should be reminded that the Code of Practice (Section 9.13) encourages the creation of memorandum of understanding to avoid future problems [**ACTION – TTU**].

It was asked whether cases had ever been allocated jointly. The Cramond lioness was cited as an example, and that it was possible but required robust legal and practical arrangements. It was asked whether MGS might act as a broker for agreements, and JO'S agreed to explore this [**ACTION – JO'S**].

TT 221/22 (Malcolm IV penny, Fife)

The Panel considered the comparanda submitted by the finder for case TT 221/22, noting the coin's rarity and that the coin was not in 'fine' condition. It was asked what would happen in cases where valuations changed significantly as a result of Panel discussions. The museums in question will be informed and extra time to raise funds can be given (Code of Practice 5.18).

It was discussed whether finders viewed TTU valuations as external or internal, and whether there should be a threshold at which external valuations are automatically sought. All agreed that future revisions to the Code of Practice should consider this [**ACTION – TTU**].

In concluding this case consideration, the Panel agreed the valuation should be raised to £8,000 based on the condition of the coin.

Other cases (chance finds)

Individual cases were considered, as recorded in the tables at the end of these minutes. Attendees with declared interests (MH for Perthshire and FH for NMS) left the room for discussion of those finds. JF showed finds to those attending through Teams.

It was noted that there are many applications from museums to the National Fund for Acquisitions (NFA), even for very low value objects. FH said that the NFA was healthy and was still offering 100% grants.

It was noted that some rings were without museum bids. Some may be acquired through the last resort process. It was asked whether the value of rings had changed, leading to museums not wishing to acquire them, but after discussion it was felt that valuations had not really changed, but the commercial desirability of rings did not always correlate with their archaeological value and museums may wish to prioritise other acquisitions.

Casual finds made on Scheduled sites were discussed, and it was asked whether these had been raised with HES. It was understood that the HES position was that no finds should ever be removed, and it was discussed whether rewards should be given in such circumstances even when metal detectors had not been used. However, it is questionable whether this is workable in practice if people encounter surface finds MMR advised that more signage is being put up at Scheduled sites to increase awareness of their existence and legal restrictions, but a steer from HES should be sought for clarification [**ACTION – EF TO LIAISE WITH HES**].

Excavated assemblages

It was noted that many excavation archives had received no bids, though they will go through the last resort process, and many are cases with only modern material. The issue of what happens to disclaimed archives was discussed and JO'S suggested that MGS might be able to serve as a contact point for their disposal, for example into museum handling/education collections. [**ACTION – JO'S**]

8. AOCB

SAFAP membership

JR suggested that the review of the Code of Practice be added to the next agenda [**ACTION – JR**] and Panel members should begin to consider areas for the review to examine. JR asked whether three or four Panel meetings were planned for 2023, and EF said that three were planned. Four would be more difficult to process, and additional time may need to be committed to the Code of Practice and Treasure Trove reviews

As PM's and MMR's appointments to the Panel are ending, recommendations for new members or how to advertise for them were discussed. It was agreed that PM had been an invaluable link to the metal detecting community. In addition, voices from the north and the Islands were important. Adverts should go out widely, including to archaeology websites.

Ex gratia awards

The issue of rewards for deceased finders was discussed, particularly the honouring of any agreements with landowners. It was suggested that rewards would simply pass to the estate, but also queried whether the right to a reward legally died with the finder. RS agreed to investigate the legal position on this [**ACTION – RS**]

Sword from River Forth

The Panel discussed whether a Medieval sword being sold by Bonhams and purported to be from the River Forth should be claimed. It was advertised as being found in the late 19th Century in the River Forth and connected with the Battle of Stirling Bridge, though this provenance is not proven, and the sword has passed through an unknown number of sellers. English ownership laws may also apply. The 2000 amnesty was discussed but it was agreed that this only applied to finds accessioned into museums.

The Panel discussed whether the findspot information was sufficient for a claim, and whether disclaiming would set a precedent. It was agreed that it should be claimed on the grounds that even if its provenance cannot be determined, it will have undergone due process. EF agreed to show the sword to Panel members after the meeting as it had been brought into the TTU offices but not available in the meeting room.

RS left the meeting and VC then joined

AOB

Archaeology Scotland

PY has written to JR and EF regarding the Archaeology Scotland editorial board and its quarterly publication. TTU and SAFAP might form a theme in a future issue, with articles on metal detecting, heritage crime and the work of TTU and SAFAP suggested. There is an October 2023 deadline for copy, and a December 2023 publication date. This might also tie in with the review. It was agreed that this was a good idea and that the publication and web site might also be a vehicle for advertising Panel positions. PY said he was happy to be a conduit for any discussions with the editorial board. **[ACTION – EF TO COORDINATE WITH PY]**

ALGAO

FH reported that, as part of the Archaeology Strategy, ALGAO had some queries about Treasure Trove, including treatment of human remains, chance finds and findspot information. It was queried why there was no ALGAO representative on SAFAP, and it was agreed it should be a priority for future appointments. A liaison meeting with ALGAO will be arranged, with MH and JO'S representing the Panel and EF attending for TTU **[ACTION – EF, MH, JO'S]**.
